INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

Board of Directors
East Aldine Management District
Harris County, Texas

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities and each major fund of East Aldine Management District (the "District"), as of and for the year ended December 31, 2015, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinions

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities and each major fund of the District as of December 31, 2015, and the respective changes in financial position for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that Management's Discussion and Analysis and the Schedule of Revenues, Expenditures, and Changes in Fund Balance – Budget and Actual – General Fund be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements. The supplementary information required by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality as published in the *Water District Financial Management Guide* is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. The supplementary information, excluding that portion marked "Unaudited" on which we express no opinion or provide any assurance, has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS
FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 2015**

Management's discussion and analysis of East Aldine Management District's (the "District") financial performance provides an overview of the District's financial activities for the fiscal year ended December 31, 2015. Please read it in conjunction with the District's financial statements.

USING THIS ANNUAL REPORT

This annual report consists of a series of financial statements. The basic financial statements include: (1) fund financial statements and government-wide financial statements and (2) notes to the financial statements. The fund financial statements and government-wide financial statements combine both: (1) the Statement of Net Position and Governmental Funds Balance Sheet and (2) the Statement of Activities and Governmental Fund Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balances. This report also includes other supplementary information in addition to the basic financial statements.

GOVERNMENT-WIDE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The District's annual report includes two financial statements combining the government-wide financial statements and the fund financial statements. The government-wide portion of these statements provides both long-term and short-term information about the District's overall status. Financial reporting at this level uses a perspective similar to that found in the private sector with its basis in full accrual accounting and elimination or reclassification of internal activities.

The first of the government-wide statements is the Statement of Net Position. This information is found in the Statement of Net Position column. The Statement of Net Position is the District-wide statement of its financial position presenting information that includes all of the District's assets and liabilities, with the difference reported as net position. Over time, increases or decreases in net position may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the District as a whole is improving or deteriorating. Evaluation of the overall health of the District would extend to other non-financial factors.

The government-wide portion of the Statement of Activities reports how the District's net position changed during the current fiscal year. All current year revenues and expenses are included regardless of when cash is received or paid.

FUND FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The combined statements also include fund financial statements. A fund is a grouping of related accounts that is used to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. The District has three governmental fund types. The General Fund accounts for resources not accounted for in another fund, sales tax revenues and general expenditures. The Debt Service Fund accounts for financial resources restricted, committed or assigned for servicing bond debt. The Capital Projects Fund accounts for financial resources restricted, committed or assigned for acquisition or construction of facilities and related costs.

FUND FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Continued)

Governmental funds are reported in each of the financial statements. The focus in the fund statements provides a distinctive view of the District's governmental funds. These statements report short-term fiscal accountability focusing on the use of spendable resources and balances of spendable resources available at the end of the year. They are useful in evaluating annual financing requirements of the District and the commitment of spendable resources for the near-term.

Since the government-wide focus includes the long-term view, comparisons between these two perspectives may provide insight into the long-term impact of short-term financing decisions. The adjustments columns, the Reconciliation of the Governmental Funds Balance Sheet to the Statement of Net Position and the Reconciliation of the Governmental Funds Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balances to the Statement of Activities explain the differences between the two presentations and assist in understanding the differences between these two perspectives.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The accompanying notes to the financial statements provide information essential to a full understanding of the government-wide and fund financial statements.

OTHER INFORMATION

In addition to the financial statements and accompanying notes, this report also presents certain required supplementary information ("RSI"). A budgetary comparison schedule is included as RSI for the General Fund.

GOVERNMENT-WIDE FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

Net position may serve over time as a useful indicator of the District's financial position. In the case of the District, assets exceeded liabilities by \$12,577,318 as of December 31, 2015.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE DISTRICT'S GOVERNMENTAL FUNDS

The District's combined fund balances as of December 31, 2015, were \$9,873,455, a decrease of \$4,758,251 from the prior year.

The General Fund fund balance decreased by \$2,466,714, primarily due to strong sales tax revenue and a contribution from Harris County which were offset by expenditures for capital outlay and transfers to the Debt Service Fund.

The Debt Service Fund fund balance increased by \$449,757, primarily due to transfers from the General Fund which exceeded the debt service payments for the year.

The Capital Projects Fund fund balance decreased by \$2,741,294, primarily due to expenditures for capital improvements which exceeded contributions.

GENERAL FUND BUDGETARY HIGHLIGHTS

The Board of Directors did not amend the budget during the current fiscal year. Actual revenues were \$1,683,431 more than budgeted revenues, primarily due to strong sales tax revenues as well as infrastructure refunds which were not budgeted. Actual expenditures were \$1,892,508 more than budgeted expenditures, primarily due to capital expenditures being over budget.

CAPITAL ASSETS

The District's capital assets as of December 31, 2015, amount to \$16,822,554 (net of accumulated depreciation). These capital assets include land, office equipment and fixtures, leasehold improvements, street signage, as well as construction in progress.

LONG-TERM DEBT ACTIVITY

At the end of the current fiscal year, the District had total bond debt payable of \$12,726,000 and a note payable to a bank in the amount of \$1,332,249. The changes in the debt position of the District during the fiscal year ended December 31, 2015, are summarized as follows:

The District's Series 2005 and Series 2009 Bonds carry an underlying rating of "A" by Standard and Poor's. The Series 2005 and Series 2009 Bonds have an insured rating of "AA" from Standard and Poor's by virtue of bond insurance issued by Assured Guaranty. The Series 2012 Bonds are non-rated. The above ratings reflect all changes during the fiscal year ended December 31, 2015.

NOTE 1. CREATION OF DISTRICT

The Aldine Community Improvement District (the “District”) was created by the Texas Legislature under provisions of House Bill No. 741, of the 77th Legislature, effective June 17, 2001, codified as Chapter 3817, Texas Special District Local Laws Code (formerly Subchapter K, of Chapter 376, Texas Local Government Code) and as amended in 2005 by House Bill No. 3550, of the 79th Legislature and in 2011 by House Bill 900 of the 82nd Legislature. On September 16, 2003, the District changed its name to the Aldine Improvement District. On April 17, 2007, the District changed its name to East Aldine Management District. The District was created as a special district under Article III, Sections 52 and 52-A and Article XVI, Section 59 of the Texas Constitution. Pursuant to the provisions of the Act creating the District, the District is empowered to promote, develop, encourage, and maintain employment, commerce, transportation, housing, tourism, recreation, arts entertainment, economic development, safety, and the public welfare in the District. The Board of Directors held its first meeting on June 25, 2001, and sold its first bonds on July 21, 2005.

NOTE 2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accompanying basic financial statements have been prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America as promulgated by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (“GASB”). In addition, the accounting records of the District are maintained generally in accordance with the *Water District Financial Management Guide* published by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (the “Commission”).

The District is a political subdivision of the State of Texas governed by an appointed board. GASB has established the criteria for determining whether or not a given entity is a primary government or a component unit of a primary government. The primary criteria are that it has a separately appointed governing body, it is legally separate, and it is fiscally independent of other state and local governments. Under these criteria the District is considered a primary government and is not a component unit of any other government. Additionally, no other entities meet the criteria for inclusion in the District’s financial statements as component units.

Financial Statement Presentation

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Government Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Codification of Governmental Accounting and Financial Reporting Standards Part II, Financial Reporting.

The GASB Codification sets forth standards for external financial reporting for all state and local government entities, which include a requirement for a Statement of Net Position and a Statement of Activities. It requires the classification of net position into three components: Net Investment in Capital Assets, Restricted, and Unrestricted. These classifications are defined as follows:

- Net Investment in Capital Assets – This component of net position consists of capital assets, including restricted capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation and reduced by the outstanding balances of any bonds, mortgages, notes, or other borrowings that are attributable to the acquisition, construction, or improvements of those assets.
- Restricted Net Position – This component of net position consists of external constraints placed on the use of assets imposed by creditors (such as through debt covenants), grantors, contributors, or laws or regulation of other governments or constraints imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.
- Unrestricted Net Position – This component of net position consists of assets that do not meet the definition of “Restricted” or “Net Investment in Capital Assets.”

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, generally it is the District’s policy to use restricted resources first.

Government-Wide Financial Statements

The Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities display information about the District as a whole. The District’s Statement of Net Position and Statement of Activities are combined with the governmental fund financial statements. The District is viewed as a special-purpose government and has the option of combining these financial statements.

The Statement of Net Position is reported by adjusting the governmental fund types to report on the full accrual basis, economic resource basis, which recognizes all long-term assets and receivables as well as long-term debt and obligations. Any amounts recorded due to and due from other funds are eliminated in the Statement of Net Position.

Government-Wide Financial Statements (Continued)

The Statement of Activities is reported by adjusting the governmental fund types to report only items related to current year revenues and expenditures. Items such as capital outlay are allocated over their estimated useful lives as depreciation expense. Internal activities between governmental funds, if any, are eliminated by adjustment to obtain net total revenue and expense of the government-wide Statement of Activities.

Fund Financial Statements

As discussed above, the District's fund financial statements are combined with the government-wide statements. The fund statements include a Balance Sheet and Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balances.

Governmental Funds

The District has three governmental funds and considers each to be a major fund.

General Fund - To account for resources not required to be accounted for in another fund, sales tax revenues and general expenditures.

Debt Service Fund - To account for the financial resources restricted, committed or assigned for servicing bond debt.

Capital Projects Fund – To account for financial resources restricted, committed or assigned for acquisition or construction of facilities and related costs.

Basis of Accounting

The District uses the modified accrual basis of accounting for governmental fund types. The modified accrual basis of accounting recognizes revenues when both “measurable and available.” Measurable means the amount can be determined. Available means collectable within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay current liabilities. The District considers revenue reported in governmental funds to be available if they are collectable within 60 days after year end. Also, under the modified accrual basis of accounting, expenditures are recorded the related fund liability is incurred, except for principal and interest on long-term debt, which are recognized as expenditures when payment is due.

Basis of Accounting (Continued)

Amounts transferred from one fund to another fund are reported as other financing sources or uses. Loans by one fund to another fund and amounts paid by one fund for another fund are reported as interfund receivables and payables in the Governmental Funds Balance Sheet if there is intent to repay the amount and if the debtor fund has the ability to repay the advance on a timely basis.

Capital Assets

Capital assets, which include office equipment and fixtures, as well as leasehold improvements, are reported in the government-wide Statement of Net Position. All capital assets are valued at historical cost or estimated historical cost if actual historical cost is not available. Donated assets are valued at their fair market value on the date donated. Repairs and maintenance are recorded as expenditures in the governmental fund incurred and as an expense in the government-wide Statement of Activities. Capital asset additions, improvements and preservation costs that extend the life of an asset are capitalized and depreciated over the estimated useful life of the asset. Interest costs, including developer interest, engineering fees and certain other costs are capitalized as part of the asset.

Assets are capitalized, including infrastructure assets, if they have an original cost greater than \$5,000 and a useful life over two years. Depreciation is calculated on each class of depreciable property using the straight-line method of depreciation. Estimated useful lives are as follows:

Budgeting

In compliance with governmental accounting principles, the Board of Directors annually adopts an unappropriated budget for the General Fund. The budget was not amended during the current fiscal year.

Pensions

A pension plan has not been established. The District does not have employees, except that the Internal Revenue Service has determined that the directors are considered to be employees for federal payroll tax purposes only.

Measurement Focus

Measurement focus is a term used to describe which transactions are recognized within the various financial statements. In the government-wide Statement of Net Position and Statement of Activities, the governmental activities are presented using the economic resources measurement focus. The accounting objectives of this measurement focus are the determination of operating income, changes in net position, financial position, and cash flows. All assets and liabilities associated with the activities are reported. Fund equity is classified as net position on the Statement of Net Position.

Governmental fund types are accounted for on a spending or financial flow measurement focus. Accordingly, only current assets and current liabilities are included on the Balance Sheet, and the reported fund balances provide an indication of available spendable or appropriable resources. Operating statements of governmental fund types report increases and decreases in available spendable resources. Fund balances in governmental funds are classified using the following hierarchy:

Nonspendable: amounts that cannot be spent either because they are in nonspendable form or because they are legally or contractually required to be maintained intact.

Restricted: amounts that can be spent only for specific purposes because of constitutional provisions, or enabling legislation, or because of constraints that are imposed externally.

Committed: amounts that can be spent only for purposes determined by a formal action of the Board of Directors. The Board is the highest level of decision-making authority for the District. This action must be made no later than the end of the fiscal year. Commitments may be established, modified, or rescinded only through ordinances or resolutions approved by the Board. The District does not have any committed fund balances.

Assigned: amounts that do not meet the criteria to be classified as restricted or committed, but that are intended to be used for specific purposes. The District has not adopted a formal policy regarding the assignment of fund balance and does not have any assigned fund balances.

Unassigned: all other spendable amounts in the General Fund.

When expenditures are incurred for which restricted, committed, assigned or unassigned fund balances are available, the District considers amounts to have been spent first out of restricted funds, then committed funds, then assigned funds, and finally unassigned funds.

Accounting Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

The bonds are payable from the proceeds of the 1% sales and use tax collected within the District.

NOTE 4. SIGNIFICANT BOND RESOLUTION AND LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

A. The Series 2009 bond resolution calls for the establishment of a Reserve Fund requirement to secure payment of all bonds outstanding, including the Series 2005 bonds. The Reserve Fund requirement is \$1,236,100, which is the lesser of (i) the maximum annual debt service requirement or (ii) the maximum amount in a reasonably required reserve fund that can be invested without restriction to yield. As of December 31, 2015, the District has established an account in which the Reserve Fund requirement of \$1,236,100 has been deposited.

- B. The Series 2005 and 2009 bond resolutions state, that on or before the last business day of each month any of the bonds remain outstanding, the District is required to transfer to the Debt Service Fund, in approximately equal monthly installments, an amount that will be sufficient to accumulate the amount required to pay the next interest and principal payments on the outstanding bonds. The resolutions state that monies from pledged revenue shall be applied first to the Debt Service Fund for payment of debt service on all outstanding bonds. If on any debt service payment date the amount in the Debt Service Fund is insufficient to make the required payment, the District shall apply amounts from the Reserve Fund to the extent necessary to make such payment. During the current fiscal year, the District transferred \$2,935,344 from the General Fund to the Debt Service Fund for the purpose of making the required debt service payments.
- C. The bond resolutions state that the District will provide continuing disclosure of certain financial information and operating data to each nationally recognized municipal securities information repository and the state information depository. This information, along with the audited annual financial statements, is to be provided within six months after the end of each fiscal year.

NOTE 5. DEPOSITS AND INVESTMENTS

Deposits

Custodial credit risk is the risk that, in the event of the failure of a depository financial institution, a government will not be able to recover deposits or will not be able to recover collateral securities that are in the possession of an outside party. The District's deposit policy for custodial credit risk requires compliance with the provisions of Texas statutes.

Texas statutes require that any cash balance in any fund shall, to the extent not insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation or its successor, be continuously secured by a valid pledge to the District of securities eligible under the laws of Texas to secure the funds of the District, having an aggregate market value, including accrued interest, at all times equal to the uninsured cash balance in the fund to which such securities are pledged. At fiscal year end, the carrying amount of the District's deposits was \$1,154,643 and the bank balance was \$1,486,571. Of the bank balance, \$746,666 was covered by federal depository insurance, and the remaining amount was covered by collateral pledged in the name of the District and held in a third party depository.

Investments

Under Texas law, the District is required to invest its funds under written investment policies that primarily emphasize safety of principal and liquidity and that address investment diversification, yield, maturity, and the quality and capability of investment management, and all District funds must be invested in accordance with the following investment objectives: understanding the suitability of the investment to the District's financial requirements, first; preservation and safety of principal, second; liquidity, third; marketability of the investments if the need arises to liquidate the investment before maturity, fourth; diversification of the investment portfolio, fifth; and yield, sixth. The District's investments must be made "with judgment and care, under prevailing circumstances, that a person of prudence, discretion, and intelligence would exercise in the management of the person's own affairs, not for speculation, but for investment, considering the probable safety of capital and the probable income to be derived." No person may invest District funds without express written authority from the Board of Directors.

Texas statutes include specifications for and limitations applicable to the District and its authority to purchase investments as defined in the Public Funds Investment Act. Authorized investments are summarized as follows: (1) obligations of the United States or its agencies and instrumentalities, (2) direct obligations of the State of Texas or its agencies and instrumentalities, (3) certain collateralized mortgage obligations, (4) other obligations, the principal of and interest on which are unconditionally guaranteed or insured by the State of Texas or the United States or its agencies and instrumentalities, including obligations that are fully guaranteed or insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation or by the explicit full faith and credit of the United States, (5) certain A rated or higher obligations of states, agencies, counties, cities, and other political subdivisions of any state, (6) bonds issued, assumed or guaranteed by the State of Israel, (7) insured or collateralized certificates of deposit, (8) certain fully collateralized repurchase agreements secured by delivery, (9) certain bankers' acceptances with limitations, (10) commercial paper rated A-1 or P-1 or higher and a maturity of 270 days or less, (11) no-load

The District invests in TexSTAR, an external investment pool that is not SEC-registered. First Southwest Asset Management, Inc. and JPMorgan Chase manage the daily operations of TexSTAR. The fair value of the District's position in the pool is the same as the value of pool shares.

Credit risk is the risk that the issuer or other counterparty to an investment will not fulfill its obligations. At December 31, 2015, the District's investments in TexSTAR and Money Market Mutual Fund were rated AAAM by Standard and Poor's.

Interest rate risk is the risk that changes in interest rates will adversely affect the fair value of an investment. The District considers the investments in TexSTAR and Money Market Mutual Funds to have a maturity of less than one year due to the fact the share position can usually be redeemed each day at the discretion of the District, unless there has been a significant change in value.

Restrictions

All cash and investments of the Debt Service Fund are restricted for the payment of debt service and the cost of assessing and collecting taxes.

All cash and investments of the Capital Projects Fund are restricted for the purchase of capital assets.

NOTE 6. SALES AND USE TAX

In accordance with Chapter 3817, Texas Special Districts Local Laws Code, as amended, the District may levy a sales and use tax if authorized by a majority of the qualified voters of the District. The sales and use tax is to be used for the purpose to promote, develop, encourage, and maintain employment commerce, transportation, housing, tourism, recreation, arts, entertainment, economic development, safety, and the public welfare in the District.

On August 11, 2001, the voters of the District approved the collection of a one (1%) percent sales and use tax. On November 13, 2001, the District entered into a contract with the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas to administer and collect the sales and use tax on the District's behalf. On November 8, 2011, an election was held in a specially designated sales tax zone to authorize an additional 1% sales and use tax in the zone for projects benefiting the zone. During the current fiscal year, the District recorded sales tax revenues in the amount of \$7,979,565 and a receivable of \$609,854 at year end.

NOTE 8. TEXAS WATER DEVELOPMENT BOARD GRANTS

During a previous fiscal year, the District filed an application with the Texas Water Development Board (“the Board”) for financial assistance in the amount of \$10,486,094 from the Economically Distressed Areas Program Account for the construction of a project to provide water and wastewater services to a subdivision located in the District. The Board approved the application and provided the assistance by purchasing the District’s Sales Tax Revenue Bonds, Series 2012 in the amount of \$577,000 and issuing a grant to the District in the amount \$9,909,094. The funds provided by the sale of the bonds and the receipt of the grant may only be used for the above mentioned project. Any surplus funds not used to complete the project must be returned to the Board. At the completion of the project, it will be conveyed to the City of Houston and will be operated and maintained by the City. The grant and bond monies still on hand as of December 31, 2015, are required to be escrowed until release of the escrow is approved by the Board. During the prior fiscal year, the District received bids for the project with the low bid totaling just under \$8,000,000. Through the end of the current fiscal year, the District has expended \$7,628,053 on the project. Such amount has been included in construction in progress.

NOTE 9. SUBLEASE AGREEMENT

On May 23, 2003, the District entered into a sublease agreement with Aldine Communities Together, Inc. (“ACT”). On January 1, 2002, ACT had previously entered into a lease agreement for a 4,601 square foot storefront space being used as a Police Store Front. The original lease agreement was for a five year period from February 1, 2002 to January 31, 2007. In April 2003, the lease was extended 10 years and will run through January 31, 2017. The lease amount is \$24 per year. The lease also included a provision for a \$31.50 monthly charge for water service. All provisions of the original lease are applicable to the District. The District entered into the sublease in order to assist ACT in carrying out its organizational purpose and to provide funding and professional services to accomplish the renovation and expansion of the Police Store Front facilities.

NOTE 10. INTERLOCAL AGREEMENTS

During a prior year, the District entered into an agreement with Harris County, in which the District agreed to contribute up to \$250,000 toward the construction of a water distribution system to benefit residents of the District. The estimated cost of the project was \$730,056, and the County had grant funds available in the amount of \$524,114 to contribute toward the cost of the project. Should the cost of the project be less than the total of the amount the County had available plus the \$250,000 contributed by the District during the prior fiscal year, the County would remit payment to the District in the amount of the difference, not to exceed \$250,000. Upon completion, the project was transferred to the City of Houston. During the current fiscal

year, the County returned \$187,933 to the District.

During a prior year, the District entered into another agreement with Harris County, in which the District agreed to contribute up to \$815,637 toward the construction of a sanitary sewer system in the Mary Eleanor and Mary Francis subdivisions to benefit residents of the District. The estimated cost of the project was \$1,227,225, and the County had grant funds available in the amount of \$1,000,000 to contribute toward the cost of the project. Should the cost of the project be less than the total of the amount the County has available plus the \$815,637 contributed by the District, the County would remit payment to the District in the amount of the difference, not to exceed \$815,637. The project has been completed and has been transferred to a utility district that operates within the boundaries of the District. During the current fiscal year, the County returned \$330,536 to the District.

During a prior fiscal year, the District entered into an agreement with Harris County, in which the District agreed to contribute up to \$436,144 toward the construction of a sanitary sewer system in the Inwood Place subdivision located within the District. The estimated cost of the project was \$1,665,866 and the County had grant funds available in the amount of \$1,229,722. Should the cost of the project be less than the total of the amount the County had available plus the \$436,144 contributed by the District, the County would remit payment to the District in the amount of the difference, not to exceed \$436,144. During the current fiscal year, the County returned funds to the District in the amount of \$273,683. The project was transferred to the City of Houston during the current fiscal year.

Also during a prior fiscal year, the District entered into an agreement with Harris County, in which the District agreed to contribute up to \$178,006 toward the engineering and construction costs of a water distribution and sanitary sewer system in Emerson Place subdivision located within the District. The estimated cost of the project is \$1,222,846 and the County has grant funds available in the amount of \$1,044,840. During the prior fiscal year, the District recorded expenditures in the amount of \$106,175 for engineering related to this project. During the current fiscal year, the District made payments of \$95,491 to Harris County. Also, during the current fiscal year, the County returned funds to the District in the amount of \$42,506. The project was transferred to the City of Houston during the current fiscal year.

During the prior fiscal year, the District entered into an agreement with Harris County in which the District agreed to contribute up to \$21,000 toward the construction of sanitary sewer lines within the District. The estimated cost of the project was \$779,100 and the County had grant funds available in the amount of \$758,100. Should the cost of the project be less than the total of the amount the County had available plus the \$21,000 contributed by the District, the County would remit payment to the District in the amount of the difference, not to exceed \$21,000.

In the current fiscal year, the District entered into an agreement with Harris County in which the District agreed to contribute up to \$88,200 toward the construction of water distribution and sanitary sewer systems within the District. The estimated cost of the project is \$1,068,086 and the County has grant funds available in the amount of \$979,886. Should the cost of the project be less than the total of the amount the County had available plus the \$88,200 contributed by the District, the County would remit payment to the District in the amount of the difference, not to exceed \$88,200.

Also during the current fiscal year, the District entered into an agreement with Harris County in which the District agreed to fund \$110,250 toward the construction costs and \$39,674 toward the management of a water and waste water project within the boundaries of the District. When the construction bid came in at \$1,155,318, the District agreed to fund the short fall of \$41,771 with the remainder of the costs to be paid by Harris County.

NOTE 11. NOTE PAYABLE TO BANK

During a prior fiscal year, the District borrowed \$3,218,575 from a bank to purchase 61 acres of land within the District. The note payable is for a term of ten years with monthly payments of \$31,520, including interest at 3.25%. The total cost of the land, including funds paid by the District, was \$4,300,126.

During the current fiscal year, the District conveyed approximately 16 acres to a community college so that it could establish a new community college facility within the District. The District also conveyed approximately 7.5 acres to a non-profit organization which provides community development and human services, such as workforce development and training, financial services and other support services. The organization agrees to use the land to establish a new community facility within the District which the District believes will provide construction jobs as well as permanent jobs, will be a significant benefit to retail and commercial establishments within the District, and will provide opportunities to District residents for

education, training, and job skills. In addition, the District conveyed approximately 5.1 acres of land to Harris County so that it may establish a new 911 emergency dispatch center located inside the District. The District has determined that the facility would provide construction jobs as well as permanent jobs and would provide added safety and health support for the residents and businesses of the District. The total cost of these three parcels of land was \$2,016,125.

NOTE 12. RISK MANAGEMENT

The District is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts, theft of, damage to and destruction of assets, errors and omissions, and natural disasters. The District carries commercial insurance for its fidelity bonds and participated in the Texas Municipal League Intergovernmental risk Pool (TML) to provide general liability, automobile, errors and omissions, law enforcement, real and personal property, boiler and machinery, crime, and workers compensation coverage. The District, along with other participating entities, contributes annual amounts determined by TML's management. As claims arise they are submitted and paid by TML. During the fiscal year ended December 31, 2015, the District contributed \$16,701 to the fund for this insurance coverage. There have been no significant reductions in coverage from the prior year and settlements have not exceeded coverage in the past three years.

NOTE 13. OFFICE LEASE AGREEMENT

During a prior year, the District completed the construction of new office facilities in a shopping center within the District. The District entered into a lease agreement for the facilities with the shopping center for an initial term of 60 months beginning in March, 2011. The District is currently paying \$3,821 per month, or \$45,857 per year, during the initial lease term. Lease expense for the current fiscal year was \$45,857.

NOTE 14. INTERFUND PAYABLES AND RECEIVABLES

As of December 31, 2015, the District had the following interfund liability: the Capital Projects Fund owed the General Fund \$686,936 for amounts returned to the District by Harris County which were intended for the General Fund but deposited into the Capital Projects Fund bank account less items paid by the General Fund which were to be paid from bond and/or grant proceeds.

NOTE 15. SPECIAL SALES AND USE TAX ELECTION

On November 8, 2011, an election was held to determine whether the District should be able to levy and collect a one percent special sales and use tax within the special sales and use tax zone established by the District. Such tax would be in addition to the existing sales and use tax levied within the District. Voters in the District approved the one percent special sales and use tax. The special sales and use tax was first levied by the District on November 16, 2011. See Note 6 for current year activity.
